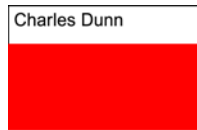

Introduction to the L.A. Stats, 2006 Edition


This is a collection of business and economic indicators for Los Angeles Five-county Area (Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, and Ventura counties) and in most instances our neighbor to the south -- San Diego County. A variety of private and public sources are used, and all tables will have a citation as to the source.

Los Angeles County is one of 58 counties in the state of California, and has a land area of 4,752.3 square miles. This would be somewhat smaller than the state of Connecticut. The County contains 88 separate incorporated cities, as well as many unincorporated communities. The County has some unique geographic aspects: 70 miles of coast on the Pacific Ocean, a major mountain range (the San Gabriels), with one peak of 10,064 ft., and the northern portion of the County is part of the Mojave Desert. The County is on approximately the same latitude as Atlanta, Georgia, and Dallas, Texas.

Clarifications & Notes on Changes

Census 2000 Data

Civilian Labor Force Series vs. Industry Employment Series

The civilian labor force (CLF) series and the industry employment (IE) series are both employment data but collected differently. The CLF series is a survey of households **of a given geographic area**. It also allows the calculation of unemployment rate because the survey asks for the person's intention on job seeking if the person is currently not working. It does not distinguish between full-time and part-time workers, self-employed, and multiple job holders. The IE series is collected by the California Employment Development Department (EDD) **at the place of employment**. It is more often used as employment indicators because it has detailed industry breakdowns. Nonfarm employment, a major subset of the industry employment series, is the most commonly used employment indicator.

The two series can diverge for a variety of reasons, including multiple jobs per person, living and working at different counties, and being self-employed. Thus they should not be compared directly with the purpose of inferring precise statistics from the divergence of the two series.

FBI's Crime Index

The Dept. of Justice recommends the development of a more robust index where the severity of the crimes is also reflected in the index (instead of just the number), and therefore it has suspended the publication of the Crime Index that's released in its Uniform Crime Report. (For more information, please consult http://www.fbi.gov/ucr/cius_04/summary/index.html) We will continue to use the old index (by combining the reported violent and property crimes) until the new index is published.

Frequently Asked Questions

Why are there more women-owned businesses than the total no. of businesses in L.A. County?

The total number of businesses listed does not include self-employed or businesses that have no payroll. Many women-owned and minority "businesses" are independent contractors or self-employed.

Section A: County Summaries

Los Angeles County Profile

- **Los Angeles County** (Los Angeles-Long Beach PMSA) covers 4,752 square miles, and has a July 1, 2005 population of 10,223,100, an increase of 1,362,800 since 1990. The County's population would make it equivalent to the eighth largest state in the nation, just behind Ohio and ahead of Michigan.
- A quick **demographic profile** of Los Angeles County indicates that: 44.6% of the population is Hispanic; 31.1% white non-Hispanic; 12.0% is Asian-Pacific Islander; and 9.5% black. 70% of the population have a high school diploma or more, while 25% have a bachelor's degree or more. (2000 Census)
- There is a diverse **economic base** in Los Angeles County (based on the concept of "export" of goods or services) using 2005 average employment as a measure. The leading industries were: 1.) direct international trade with 290,300 jobs; 2.) tourism with 263,500; 3.) motion picture/TV production with 241,100; 4.) technology with 207,300; and 4.) business & professional services with 165,100.
- The "**new economy**" of Los Angeles County often is technology driven, and would include bio-med, digital information technology, and environmental technology. This builds on the vibrant technological research capabilities of the County. Another key driver is creativity, and there is a growing fusion between technology and creativity such as in video games.
- Los Angeles is the largest **manufacturing center** in the U.S., with 470,400 workers in these activities in 2005. The largest components were: apparel with 61,500 jobs; computer & electronic products with 60,500; transportation products with 51,900; fabricated metal products with 48,200; food products with 43,400; and furniture with 25,500.
- **International trade** is a major component of the area's economy. The "Los Angeles Customs District" (including the ports of Long Beach and Los Angeles, Port Hueneme, and Los Angeles International Airport) is the nation's largest, based on value of two-way trade. In 2005, this totaled \$293.9 billion, compared with \$267.5 billion for the second place New York. Major investments are being made in port and transportation facilities.
- **Higher and specialized education** is a strength of Los Angeles County, with 198 college and university campuses. These range from California Institute of Technology, the Claremont Colleges, UCLA, and USC, to specialized institutions such as the California Institute for the Arts, the Art Center College of Design, the Fashion Institute of Design and Merchandising, and the Otis Art Institute. Medical education is also a strong point with two each of medical schools, dental schools, and eye institutes, as well as specialized research and treatment facilities such as the City of Hope. The community colleges offer an array of innovative programs, such as culinary arts, fashion design, multimedia, and computer assisted design and manufacturing training.
- **Transportation** service in Los Angeles County is extensive. In addition to the ports and airports noted above, there are two other commercial airports (Bob Hope [in Burbank] and Long Beach). Besides the extensive freeway system, there is an array of rail mass transit options including Amtrak, Metrolink (commuter rail), and Metrorail (subway & light rail). Rail freight service is provided by Burlington Northern Santa Fe and the Union Pacific.
- **Quality of life** options in Los Angeles County are numerous. These range from professional sports to personal recreation at beaches, marinas, and mountain resorts. There is a growing array of fine and performing arts activities, as well as a variety of special festivals including the renowned Tournament of Roses. In the past few years, many new landmarks opened, including the Getty Center, Walt Disney Concert Hall, California Science Center and the Staples Center sports arena all in downtown Los Angeles, and the Aquarium of the Pacific in Long Beach.

Orange County Profile

- **Orange County** (Orange County PMSA) covers 948 square miles, and has a July 1, 2005 population of 3,061,100, an increase of 649,100 persons since 1990. This would make the County larger than the St. Louis MO-IL MSA.
- A quick **demographic profile** of Orange County indicates that: 51.3% of the population is white non-Hispanic; 30.8% is Hispanic; 13.8% is Asian-Pacific Islander; and 1.5% is black. 80% of the population have a high school diploma or more, while 31% have a bachelor's degree or more. (2000 Census)
- There is a diverse **economic base** in Orange County (based on the concept of "export" of goods or services) using 2005 average employment as a measure. The leading industries were: 1.) tourism with 132,100 jobs; 2.) technology with 112,200; 3.) business & professional services with 59,600; 4.) wholesale trade & logistics with 53,400; and 5.) health services/bio-medicine with 46,300.
- **Technology** is a vital force in the Orange County economy, with several "clusters" of activity, including Irvine (around both the Spectrum and UC Irvine), and in the mid-county area. Areas of emphasis include computer software, semiconductors and bio-med applications.
- Orange County is also a **major manufacturing center**, with 182,700 workers in 2005. This puts the County just behind Dallas (197,800) and ahead of Atlanta (177,400). The largest components are: computer & electronic products with 42,500 jobs; fabricated metal products with 22,800; transportation equipment with 17,000; textile mill products & apparel with 12,600; and machinery with 11,000.
- Orange County businesses have been very aggressive in **international trade**, and utilize the ports of Long Beach and Los Angeles, as well as Los Angeles International Airport, Ontario International Airport, and other support activities.
- The **higher educational assets** of Orange County are extensive, including the University of California Irvine (including a medical school), California State University Fullerton, Chapman University, and the Southern California College of Optometry. There are also several well-regarded community colleges.
- **Transportation** service in Orange County is well developed. Besides the freeway system, there is rail mass transit with service by Amtrak and Metrolink, and bus service offered by the Orange County Transit Authority. Commercial air service is offered at Orange County-John Wayne Airport.
- **Quality of life** is a strong point for the County, with nearly 40 miles of coast line with three small craft harbors. The mountains on the east side of the county offer outdoor recreational opportunities. There is also an array of fine and performing arts opportunities at the Orange County Performing Arts Center in Costa Mesa, plus professional baseball and ice hockey. And the modern theme park was born at Disneyland in Anaheim, which now includes a second park called California Adventure that's geared toward a more mature audience. There is also the Knott's Berry Farm and its sibling, Soak City USA.

Riverside-San Bernardino Area Profile

- This metropolitan area is comprised of Riverside and San Bernardino counties, and is often called the "**Inland Empire.**" It is bordered by Los Angeles and Orange counties on the west, and on the east by the states of Nevada and Arizona. Riverside County covers 7,304 square miles while San Bernardino covers 20,106. The July 1, 2005 **population** of the area totals 3,909,300, an increase of 1,288,900 persons since 1990. The area's population count would make it larger than the Phoenix-Mesa-Scottsdale MSA.
- A quick **demographic profile** of the counties indicates that in Riverside, 51.0% of the population is white non-Hispanic; 36.2% is Hispanic; 6.0% is black; and 3.8% is Asian-Pacific Islander. In San Bernardino, 44.0% is white non-Hispanic; 39.2% is Hispanic; 8.8% is black; and 4.9% is Asian-Pacific Islander. As to education, 75% of Riverside County's population have a high school diploma or more, and 17% have a bachelor's degree or more. For San Bernardino, the numbers are 74% and 16%, respectively. (2000 Census)
- There is a diverse **economic base** in the Inland Empire (based on the concept of "export" of goods or services) using 2005 average employment as a measure. The leading industries were: 1.) tourism with 97,100 jobs; 2.) wholesale trade & logistics with 45,800; 3.) health services/bio-medicine with 36,200; 4.) agriculture/food products manufacturing with 28,100; and 5.) technology with 22,700.
- The Inland Empire is also a growing **manufacturing center** with employment at the 120,200 mark as of 2005. The largest components are: fabricated metals products with 16,900 jobs; textile mills & apparel with 14,200; transportation equipment with 13,900 each; and plastics & rubber with 11,100.
- There is an **international trade** aspect to the Inland Empire's economy, in that it is a major transportation hub for both rail and truck service, has the Ontario International Airport (a UPS hub, both small packages and air freight, and for Asian service), and is a major distribution center for firms moving goods through Southern California's ports to the rest of the U.S.
- This area has an impressive array of **higher educational** activities, including the University of California Riverside, Cal State San Bernardino, University of Redlands, and the Loma Linda School of Medicine. Just to the west of the county line with Los Angeles are the Claremont College group and Cal Poly Pomona. There are also several community colleges.
- As noted above, the Inland Empire is a hub for **transportation services** in Southern California. There is the Ontario International Airport, strategic freeway access, two rail lines, and service by Amtrak and Metrolink (3 lines). There are also three ex-military air fields that are being redeveloped for commercial use: George Air Force Base as the Southern California Logistics Airport, Norton AFB as the San Bernardino International Airport, and March AFB as the March Inland Port.
- The two-county area has a diverse portfolio of **quality of life** elements. These include desert resorts with championship golf courses, and mountain resorts that offer skiing in the winter. There are also fine and performing arts. The California Speedway in Fontana is the largest auto racetrack in Southern California.

Ventura County Profile

- **Ventura County** (which is a metropolitan area) covers 2,208 square miles, and has a July 1, 2005 population of 815,500, an increase of 146,400 since 1990. The County's population is slightly larger than that of the Omaha-Council Bluffs, NE-IA MSA.
- A quick **demographic profile** of Ventura County indicates that: 56.8% of the population is white non-Hispanic, 33.4% is Hispanic, 5.4% is Asian-Pacific Islander, and 1.8% is black. 80% of the population have a high school diploma or more, while 27% have a bachelor's degree or more. (2000 Census)
- Ventura has a diverse **economic base** (based on the concept of "export" of goods or services) using 2005 average employment as a measure. The leading industries were: 1.) agriculture/food products manufacturing with 24,400 jobs; 2.) tourism with 19,900; 3.) technology with 19,200; 4.) financial services with 12,300; and 5) health services/bio-medicine with 11,100.
- There is a significant cluster of **new technology** activities in Ventura County, with a concentration around Camarillo. Bio-med giant Amgen is based in Thousand Oaks.
- There is also an **international trade** component to the County's economy, due to Port Hueneme. This is a "break-bulk" facility that handled 4,606,300 tons of cargo in 2005. The major commodities are cars, and fruit and vegetables.
- On the **higher and specialized education** front, there is California Lutheran University, and several community colleges. The new California State University-Channel Islands opened in Camarillo in 2002.
- Besides Port Hueneme and the freeways, Ventura County has **transportation** service by both Amtrak and Metrolink. Commercial air service is available at Santa Barbara to the north.
- **Quality of life** is a strong suit for Ventura County. It has about 40 miles of coast line, including two small craft harbors. There is Lake Casitas, the famed Ojai resort area, plus the Los Padres National Forest. There is still a significant agricultural presence in the County, which provides an unusual ambiance.

San Diego County Profile

- **San Diego County** covers 4,526 square miles, and had a July 1, 2005 population of 3,057,000; an increase of 552,100 persons since 1990. The County's population would make it slightly larger than Nassau-Suffolk, NY MSA.
- A quick **demographic profile** of San Diego County indicates that: 26.7% of the population is Hispanic, 54.9% white non-Hispanic, and 5.4% black. 83% of the population have a high school diploma or more, while 30% have a bachelor's degree or more. (2000 Census)
- There is a diverse **economic base** in San Diego County (based on the concept of "export" of goods or services) using 2005 average employment as a measure. The leading industries were: 1.) tourism with 116,100 jobs; 2.) technology with 94,700; 3.) business & professional services with 48,300; 4.) direct international trade with 45,000; and 4.) wholesale trade with 36,600. The military is also a major force in the County's economy.
- The "**new economy**" of San Diego County often is technology driven, and would include bio-med, communications, and computer science. This builds on the vibrant technological research capabilities of the County's business base and UC San Diego.
- San Diego is a large **manufacturing center** in the U.S., with 104,200 workers in these activities in 2005. The largest components were computer & electronic products with 26,400 jobs and transportation products with 13,900. San Diego also has the only large shipbuilding industry on the West Coast.
- **International trade** is a major component of the area's economy. The "San Diego Customs District" is a major channel for U.S.-Mexico trade. In 2005, total two-way trade at the customs district reached \$43.4 billion, with Mexico accounting for \$36.7 billion or 84.5%.
- **Tourism** is a major source of income for San Diego County. Besides its own tourist attractions such as the SeaWorld, San Diego Zoo (and Wild Animal Park), and Legoland California, San Diego also benefits economically from travelers going to and from Mexico. Several cruise ships also set sail or make port calls at San Diego.
- **Higher and specialized education** is a strength of San Diego County, with 49 college and university campuses, including University of California, San Diego (UCSD). UCSD is credited as a major driving force behind the region's technology industry. San Diego State University and Cal State San Marcos also make significant contributions to the region.
- **Transportation** service in San Diego County is extensive. There is a major commercial airport -- the San Diego International Airport (a.k.a. Lindbergh Field) -- with domestic services and international flights to Canada and Mexico. Besides the extensive freeway system, there is also heavy rail services including Amtrak, Metrolink (connecting Oceanside with Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, and San Bernardino counties), and the "Coaster" (between Oceanside and San Diego). Rail freight service is provided by BNSF.
- San Diego County is also home to several **military bases**, including Camp Pendleton (Marines), Miramar (Marines Corp aviation), and several naval stations for ships, submarines, and naval aviation. San Diego is also the home port of the U.S. Third Fleet, which covers the Eastern Pacific Ocean. Direct DoD spending accounts for 13% of San Diego's economy.
- **Quality of life** options in San Diego County are numerous. These range from professional sports to personal recreation at beaches, marinas, and mountain resorts. The 1,200-acre Balboa Park, a large urban park in the heart of San Diego, is home to several museums and the San Diego Zoo. The SeaWorld and the San Diego Zoo (and Wild Animal Park) attract visitors from near and afar, and Legoland California is a perennial favorite among children. There is a growing array of fine and performing arts activities, as well as Indian gaming.
